

Monthly Message

The Rev Paul Hardingham considers self-discipline during Lent.

This month sees the start of Lent, the season of penitence, self-examination and fasting running up to Easter. Fasting can be a neglected discipline, but it plays an important part in the Christian life. Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for 40 days and He taught His disciples to fast (i.e. not if but 'when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to others that you are fasting, but only to your Father, who is unseen.' (Matthew 6:17,18).

Why Fast?

Firstly, giving up something in my life underlines my desire to put God first in my life. Secondly, fasting shows me how much I depend on things other than God in my life, so I can surrender my idols to Him. Thirdly, fasting encourages me to have a deeper hunger and dependency for God in my life. Therefore, fasting gives me space to humbly focus on God for His strength, provision, and wisdom and results in a more intimate relationship with Christ. It also enables the Holy Spirit to reveal my true spiritual condition, leading to brokenness, repentance, and a transformed life, with a heart more attentive to God.

How can I fast?

Usually fasting involves missing one or two meals during the day, although some can't abstain from food for medical reasons. It might also include abstaining or limiting the time I give to television, alcohol or social media. However, Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines e.g. joining a study group, 'random acts of kindness', or giving more time to prayer and Bible study. Whatever you do, make Lent count this year!



Who is Richard Selby

I've been asked to write something about myself and how I ended up as the pastor at Christ Church and Edenfield, so here goes!

I'm married to Kathy, who you may know as the Methodist Circuit Superintendent. We have two grown up children, a married daughter who lives nearby in Radcliffe and a son who lives in London. We have a 19 month old granddaughter who we look after every Friday and my daughter is expecting again quite soon.

My parents were Church of England and when I was a young child we went to David Watson's church in York. But then we moved to Cheltenham and my parents couldn't find a church they liked so we stopped going! Then, at university in Leeds I met Kathy, who coaxed me into the Methodist Church. I realise now that for several years I wasn't really a Christian despite going to church most Sundays. But then I read a book by David Watson (I picked it up because I recognised the name) that led me to properly put my faith in Jesus, which transformed my life. But my faith was a bit dry and powerless until I was filled with the Holy Spirit for the first time at an Easter People conference.

My interests outside of church are hillwalking and bird watching. I go running in the winter to keep fit and to relax. I also like cars and driving and have a little open topped sports car (my retirement present to myself). On a nice day I enjoy a drive through the Dales or Wales with the roof off to go for a walk up a hill – and if two or three days of good weather coincide with some spare time I'll pack my very little tent in my very little car and go camping in the Lake District or Scotland.

I studied Mechanical Engineering at Leeds and after graduating I designed industrial gas turbines, specialising in fluid dynamics and thermodynamics. But after a couple of years I decided it would be more interesting to write the computer programs that we used and I became the company's first 'Technical Programmer', hence embarking on an increasingly dull career in IT. I ended up working for Hewlett-Packard as an IT Services consultant. I was increasingly working away from home, which was getting tedious, so I accepted an offer of redundancy and took early retirement. That was 5 years ago.

I was worried that I wouldn't have enough to do to keep me busy when I retired but was reassured when I heard God tell me that "doors will open and it will be obvious at the time". And doors certainly opened very soon! I started volunteering at The Message Trust in the Partnerships team, which was great fun and a privilege to be involved in what they do. Then the Eden Bus manager (at that time) asked me to be a trustee and treasurer for a new charity that he had founded, called Embassy, which now provides beds for homeless people and helps them into work, a home and a relationship with Jesus. I also took on quite a few extra jobs in both my previous church (Bolton Road) and in the Methodist District, as well as offering more preaching appointments. And I sort of got into the hairdressing business, but I'll tell you about that over a coffee some time if you really want to know.

So what brought me to Christ Church? I had no intention whatsoever of getting a job but then at a Message Trust prayer day I felt very clearly that God was telling me to apply. So that's what I did. The biggest open door yet!

Incidentally, I left The Message just before Christmas but I'll continue to go to Advance groups and prayer days. I'm still helping to run Embassy as the de facto HR and Finance manager.

A service has been arranged to welcome Richard Selby as lay pastor of Christ Church and Edenfield. It will be at Christ Church on Saturday 1st February at 2.30pm and will be followed by a buffet tea. If you would like to come you will be very welcome.

Smith Wigglesworth's Prophecy

Smith Wigglesworth was an illiterate plumber from Yorkshire who became a famous evangelist with an astounding, if at times unusual, healing ministry. He was an extremely prayerful man and a true man of God.

Shortly before he died in 1947, Smith Wigglesworth delivered the following prophecy:

During the next few decades there will be two distinct moves of the Holy Spirit across the church in Great Britain. The first move will affect every church that is open to receive it, and will be characterised by the restoration of the baptism and gifts of the Holy Spirit.

The second move of the Holy Spirit will result in people leaving historic churches and planting new churches. In the duration of each of these moves, the people who are involved will say, 'This is a great revival.' But the Lord says, 'No, neither is this the great revival but both are steps towards it.'

When the new church phase is on the wane, there will be evidence in the churches of something that has not been seen before: a coming together of those with an emphasis on the word and those with an emphasis on the Spirit.

When the word and the Spirit come together, there will be the biggest move of the Holy Spirit that the nations, and indeed, the world have ever seen. It will mark the beginning of a revival that will eclipse anything that has been witnessed within these shores, even the Wesleyan and Welsh revivals of former years.

The outpouring of God's Spirit will flow over from the United Kingdom to mainland Europe and, from there, will begin a missionary move to the ends of the earth.

We've all heard prophecies of imminent revivals but have so far been disappointed and so we may treat them with a degree of suspicion. But Smith Wigglesworth's prophecy of a great revival in this country is different because some of what he prophesied has now already happened, giving us confidence that the rest will also happen.

The first move of the Holy Spirit, the restoration of the "baptism and gifts of the Holy Spirit" that he prophesied, was fulfilled through the charismatic renewal that started in the 1960's. The second move of the Holy Spirit, in which people left traditional churches to join newly planted churches, has also clearly happened judging by the number of new independent churches that now exist.

Furthermore, we're also now seeing the "word and the Spirit" coming together, which Wigglesworth prophesied will mark the beginning of the revival. The coming together of word and Spirit is thought to simply mean that churches with an emphasis on "the Word" (such as the Methodist Church) and churches with an emphasis on the Spirit (such as Pentecostal churches) will put aside their differences and work together. For example, we're seeing churches of all types coming together to pray at the Greater Manchester Prayer Gatherings. And we're seeing churches and organisations across the whole spectrum joining together for Advance2020 for a major coordinated push to evangelise this country in an unprecedented way next year. And in Ramsbottom, churches of different backgrounds are working together.

It's also a reminder for all churches that when Word (solid Bible-based teaching) and Spirit (powerful experiences of the Holy Spirit) co-exist they complement each other and the Church is strong and God's work will be done.

Happy 15th birthday, YouTube!

The popular video-sharing website YouTube, which for most young people seems to have been around for ever, was in fact founded only 15 years ago, on 14th February 2005. It was launched officially in November that year after more development and testing. It is now one of the most visited sites on the internet.

YouTube was started by three former PayPal employees – Jawed Karim, Steve Chen, and Chad Hurley – and is based in California. Most of its income comes from advertising: a Nike commercial was the first video to get one million views.

The company was bought by Google in 2006 for 1.65 billion dollars after an agreement was made with mainstream media companies to avoid copyright lawsuits. However, copyright continues to be an issue: individuals find videos disappearing from their favourites list, and churches keen to use YouTube as part of worship find they can fall foul of a complex set of rules restricting use.

Still, there are very many legitimate ways for churches and individual Christians to use YouTube to advantage, as can be found on websites such as prochurchtools.com, which claims that while 95% of people under 22 use YouTube, only 20% consider going to church important.

Bible Society has found from research that “an estimated 20% of the population is open to the Bible, open to faith and interested in knowing more. What an exciting opportunity...”

The Psalm 23 Garden at RHS Chelsea Flower Show 2020, designed by Sarah Eberle, will offer visitors the chance “to stop, reflect, and feel refreshed”.

The Bible Society said: “This powerful psalm, with its visual imagery of green pastures, still waters and the valley of the shadow of death, just cries out to be turned into a garden.

“We hope you’ll love it. And after the Chelsea Flower Show, the garden will find a permanent home at the Winchester Hospice in Hampshire, where it will be a blessing to patients and families.”

The Bible Society says it is also hoping that people will “join us in creating community gardens across the country inspired by the Psalm 23 Garden. You can do this outside your office, in your school grounds, or in your churchyard. Let’s get gardening!”

Letter from Bute - 15th January 2020

Hello everyone, Welcome to, not only the New Year, but to a new decade, 2020. It seems only a short time since we were all excited, thrilled and a little worried about welcoming in a new millennium (we were very privileged really, being only the second group of people to do that since our modern calendar began). The apprehension....was brought about by the "doom and gloom" predictions, which always seem to go with a change or unique situation.

I feel a little different about the predictions of climate change. Perhaps because they seem to be already coming true, as we see fires in Australia and America, floods in the South Pacific islands, glaciers melting and weather becoming more unpredictable everywhere.

This leads me on to our very changeable weather here in Bute. October and November were warm and sunny but from the beginning of December onwards the weather became either very cold and sunny or very mild and wet with storms trundling in from the Atlantic at regular intervals. I have told you many nice things about island living but now here are a few of the other side of the coin. In the last few weeks the ferries have been off more often than all time the time since I have been here, making it difficult to decide to go over to the mainland if it is not necessary as it may be difficult to return later in the day. Besides residents own travel it meant some days no papers, or post and difficulty stocking up in the shops. For instance it was impossible to buy mince tarts, or even mincemeat, for a week or so before Christmas!

Wildlife doesn't seem to worry as much as we do about the different weather conditions. Birds seem to manage the bad weather better than us as they continue to fly and dive for fish whatever the conditions. Sometimes, watching seagulls gliding in the strong winds I am sure they are enjoying themselves. Driving along the shore on New Year's Eve just as the sun was dipping over the horizon the driver (whose eyes should have been on the road ahead) suddenly said there are two seals there. He pulled over and we all climbed out and spent the next 10 to 15 minutes watching 7 seals swimming, diving and popping up to watch us. It was a good start to our evening.

January is a quiet month in Rothesay as many of the businesses close for a month or have shorter hours, even the largest hotel, The Glenburn, closes for the whole of the month to refresh and refurbish and, probably, give the staff a rest after the busy Christmas & New Year festivities. With the weather as it is I think they have done the right thing.

It was good to see pictures of the community meal on Christmas Day and to hear your good news about your new leader. I know he will be well supported and that you will work together to bring God's love and show his grace to the people in Ramsbottom.



WORDSEARCH

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, 40 days after Christmas. Jesus is described in the Bible as the Light of the World, and so early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas. The story can be found in Luke 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West.


